

Lightboxes



Our Year Three class has been studying Light and Shadows recently in Science, and so to emulate the effect of the Earth's movement around the sun the pupils all created lightboxes.

Once they had finished putting the finishing touches on them, they were able to shine torches inside and study how light enters a room at different angles at various times. By adding objects into their scaled-down rooms and experimenting with their location, the children were able to learn about how shadows are formed and that it is possible to estimate the time from their position on the ground.



Blitz Artwork



Year Four have been learning about The Blitz in History lessons, and to try and give the children the best possible idea about how WW2 London would have looked they were asked to create pieces of artwork to depict both a city in ruins and a skyline with the frequent presence of German Luftwaffe aircraft and falling bombs. The main challenge was to strike a balance between a pitch black night sky and fire flashes.

The children also wrote stories to try and depict how people would have felt under the constant threat of this aerial bombardment, and these were read out to the rest of the class as a crossover between their history and English syllabuses.
